state of REASON: grants received

helping us save pets

Two Mauds, Inc. awarded grant of \$7,000 to REASON to be used for providing low-cost spay/neuter surgical fee assistance for those pet owners in Burke County who may not be able to afford it.

Grace Episcopal Church

Foundation located in Morganton granted REASON with \$3,750 to be used for our mission of providing low-cost spay/neuter surgical fee assistance for those pet owners who may not be able to afford it.

National Nonprofit Petco Love

invested \$1,000 in REASON to help increase access to veterinary care for pets in Burke County. This will help REASON provide low-cost spay/ neuter assistance.

In addition, we are making some structural changes and working to get our organization functioning more efficiently and effectively. After 12 years of spaying and neutering, it's clear our work in Burke County is NOT done, so we are looking for help to make REASON run like a well-oiled machine!

why should you spay or neuter pets?

Chances are, if you are a resident of Burke County, you saw a stray dog or cat on your way to work or shopping this morning. That stray was no doubt the unwanted offspring of a Burke County pet. There are many benefits to spaying or neutering your pet.

Spay and Neuter for a Happy & Healthy Pet

Spaying and neutering removes discomfort, distress, and distraction associated with breeding.

On average, spayed and neutered pets also live longer.

Spay and Neuter to Prevent Cancer

When you spay or neuter your pet, you reduce and/or eliminate the chance of prostate, testicular, uterine, and ovarian cancer.



Spay and Neuter to Prevent Unwanted Litters and Strays

Stray dogs and cats create many problems in peaceful neighbor-hoods. Stray dogs can become aggressive toward people and other animals. Both dogs and cats that are not spayed or neutered can also result in unwanted offspring.

Spay and Neuter to Promote Personal Responsibility

People created the cat and dog overpopulation crisis. Let's promote personal responsibility to solve the problem by preventing future litters. Let's make Burke County a better place for people and pets!

feline fun facts: did you know?

The oldest known pet cat existed 9,500 years ago.

In 2004, French archaeologists discovered a 9,500-year-old cat grave in Cyprus. This makes this the oldest known pet cat and it predates Egyptian art about cats by over 4,000 years!



Cats spend much of their lives sleeping.

Cats actually spend 70% of their lives sleeping which works out to around 13 to 16 hours a day. It's a cat's life!

Cats walk like camels and giraffes.

Have you ever noticed that cats walk like camels and giraffes? Their walking sequence is both right feet first, followed by both left feet, so they move half of their body forward at once. Camels and giraffes are the only other animals to walk this way.

House cats share genetic makeup with tigers.

Our little house cats share 95.6% of their genetic makeup with tigers! They also share a lot of the same behaviors such as scent and urine marking, prey stalking, and pouncing.

what to do when you find a stray

Do you know what to do if you find a stray dog or cat?

- Always report to Burke County Animal Services (828) 764-9588. Someone may be looking for their pet.
- 2. Post in the local community groups to see if anyone can help.
- Ask around with your neighbors to see if anyone recognizes the animal.

tips when you need to rehome a pet

Check the new adopter

It is strongly recommended that you inquire about the background of the person adopting the pet and whether their lifestyle can accommodate a new pet.

Check the new home

What will the new home environment be? Are there other animals? Will the new pet be inside or outside? Are there children in the household?

Check plans for health care

What plans do they have to provide health care for this pet? Do they intend to follow through with vaccinations and regular vet visits?

Would they like a list of local vets?

Check their commitment

Are the potential adopters willing to allow the new pet time to settle in? Would they agree to pay an adoption fee as a sign of their commitment?

Check on future communication

Will the adopters allow you to follow up?
Discuss a worst-case scenario where the pet
doesn't fit in. Would they promise to
contact you first?

When a couple of stray cats showed up in my backyard with kittens, I knew I was in trouble. Like many of us today, I was just making ends meet and knew I would need help to stop this from turning into a case of feline overpopulation.

Thankfully, a fellow cat rescuer gave me the number for REASON. I left them a message. and someone called me back the very next day to get my application started. In no time, I had the first cats scheduled for surgery. With their help over the next several months, all the female cats in my care were spayed. No more homeless kittens!
